Could they be future Jones Band Greats?????

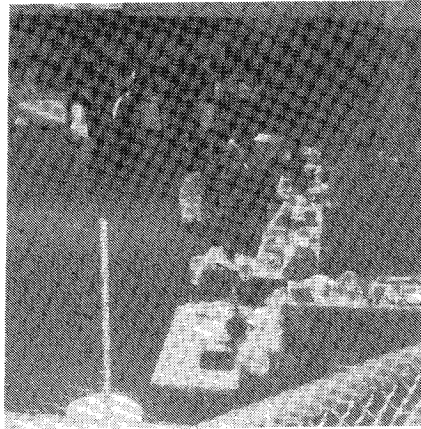
REFLECTIONS

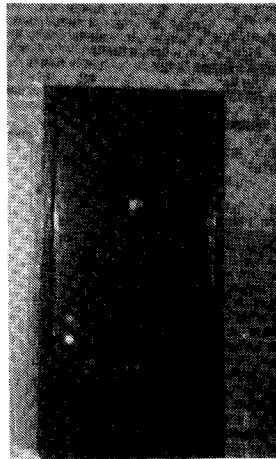

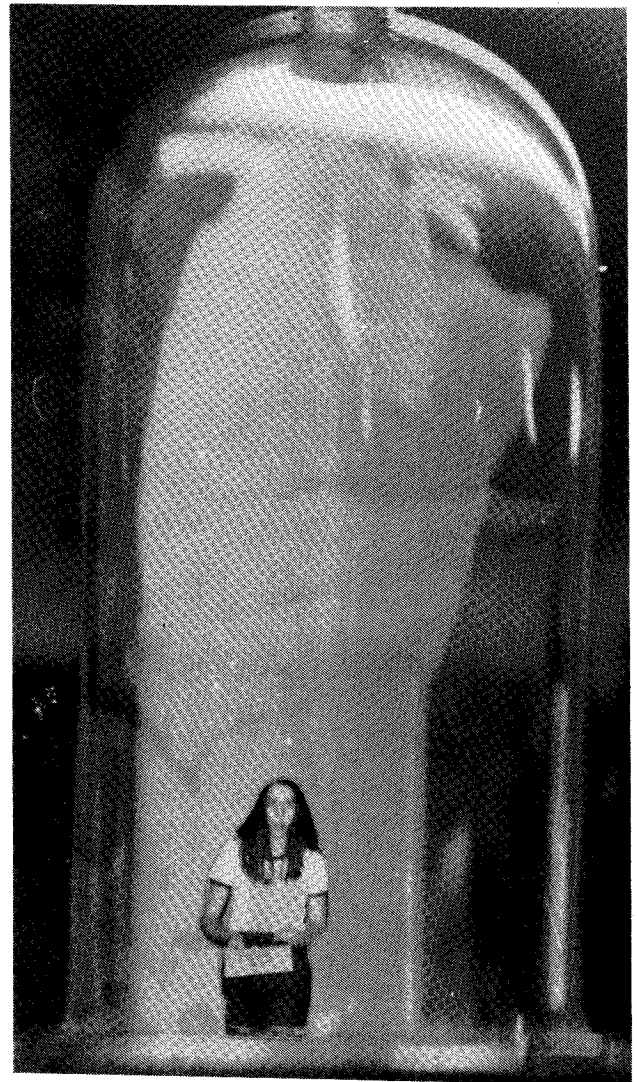
? Mystery Student?

The Jones track team started the season with a triangular meet against Mifflin and Hastings. Jones finished second with 17; Mifflin, first with 19; and Hastings, last with 10.

Jones stole the meet with a score of $62\frac{1}{2}$ to Gahanna Lincoln's $47\frac{1}{2}$ and the Stygler's 37. The reserves, however, lost to Stygler 46 to 43 with Lincoln pulling in 32. The Jones reserve is made up mostly of seventh graders while Stygler ran almost all eighth graders.

Jones had a number of standouts. Keven Wynne finished first in the hurdles; Kyle Mercer threw the shot put a fantastic 5' 2"; Chris Mullins finished first for Jones in the 440; Scott Collins finished first in the high jump. In the 440 relay Ken Miller, Mike Albert, D. J. Harris and Joe Barnes finished first for Jones, while Stu Johnson won the pole vault. In the mile relay Bob Feidner, Chris Wakeford, Don Howland and Chris Mullins finished first for Jones.

On Saturday April fourteenth, Jones played Woodward Park and smeared them 63 to 42. The reserves lost by 10, though. So far this year Jones varsity team has a record of 3-0, and the reserves a record of 1-2. The Cub Reporter wishes the track team good luck for the rest of the year.
