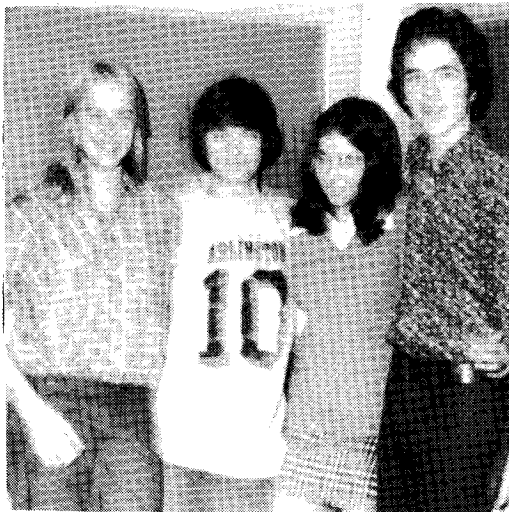

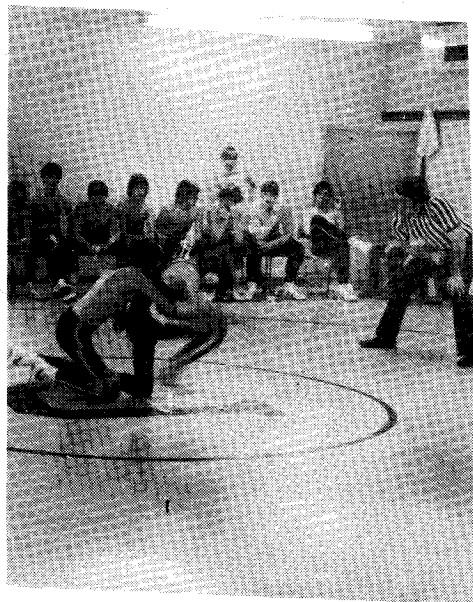
Wrestling

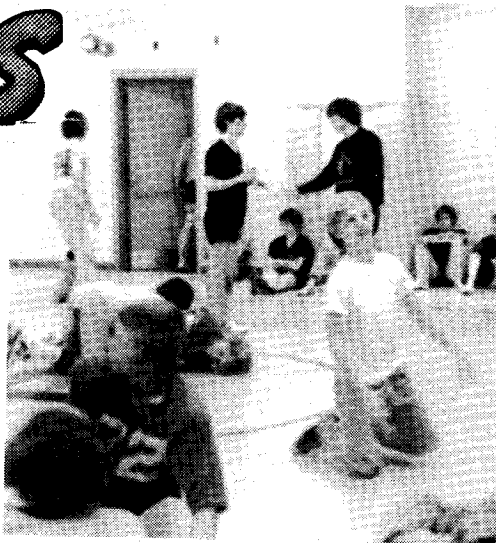
