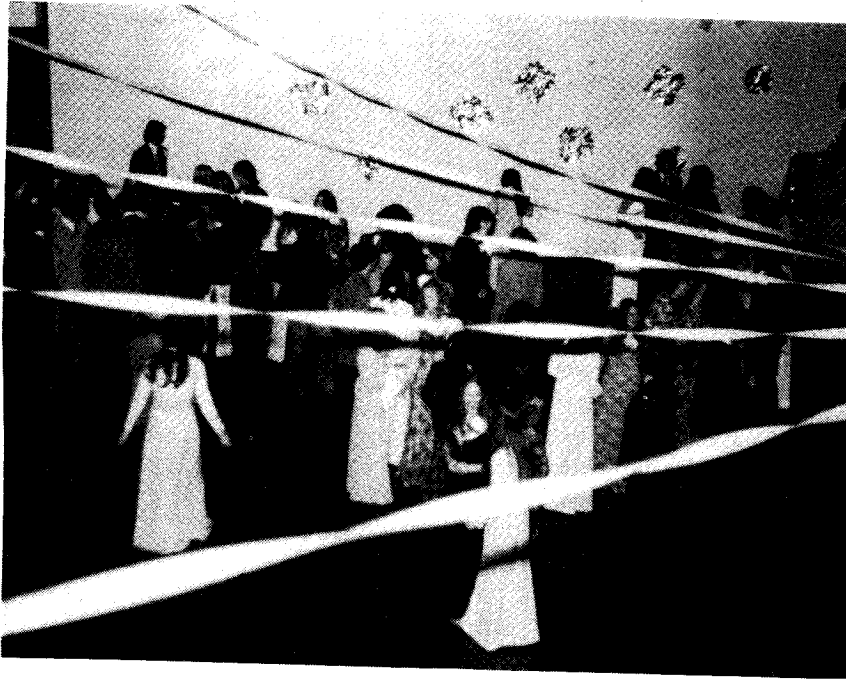

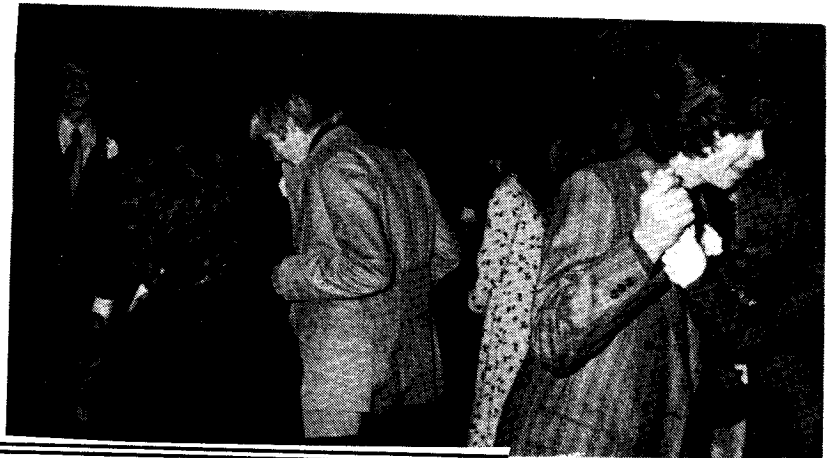

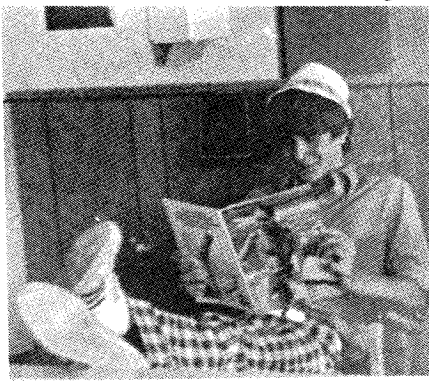
The Jones Science Fair will be held here during the second week of May, with certificate and trophy awards being given in the various areas.

Mrs. Shanks' husband is a salesman for Ashland Chemicals.

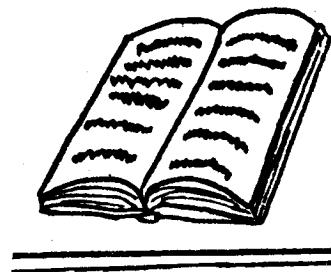

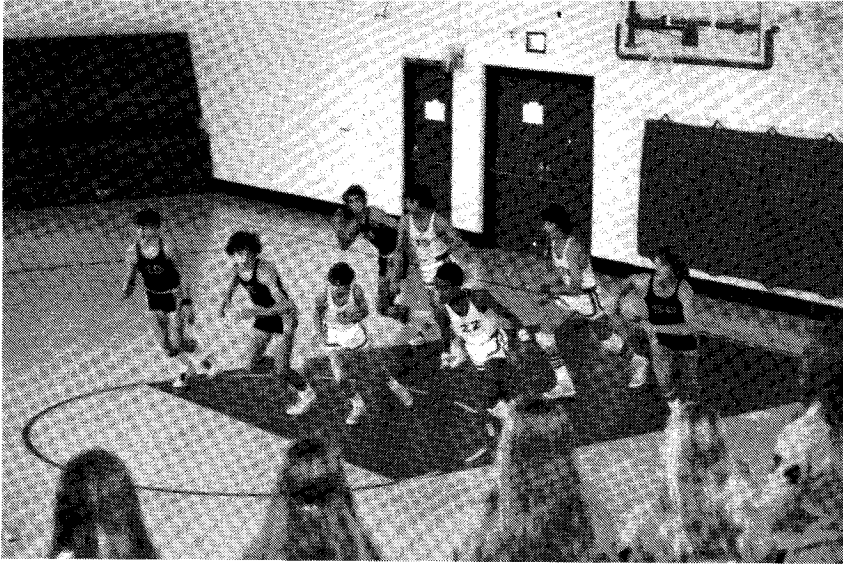
Our mystery girl for this month is in section 7-13. She is tall and has short brown hair. She has Mr. Stout 2nd period every day for geography. She likes bowling.

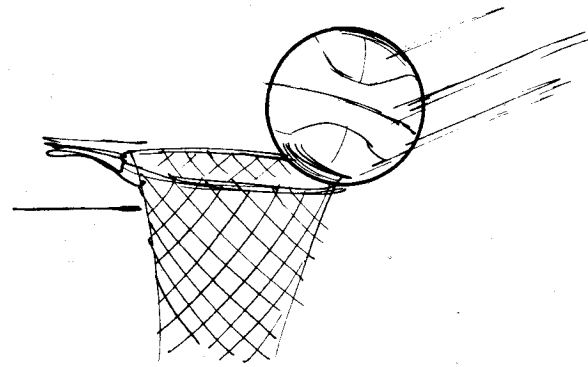
