Below is an observation of one of Mrs. Gurney's students.

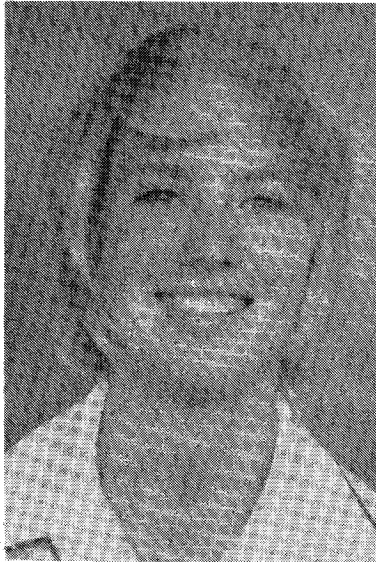

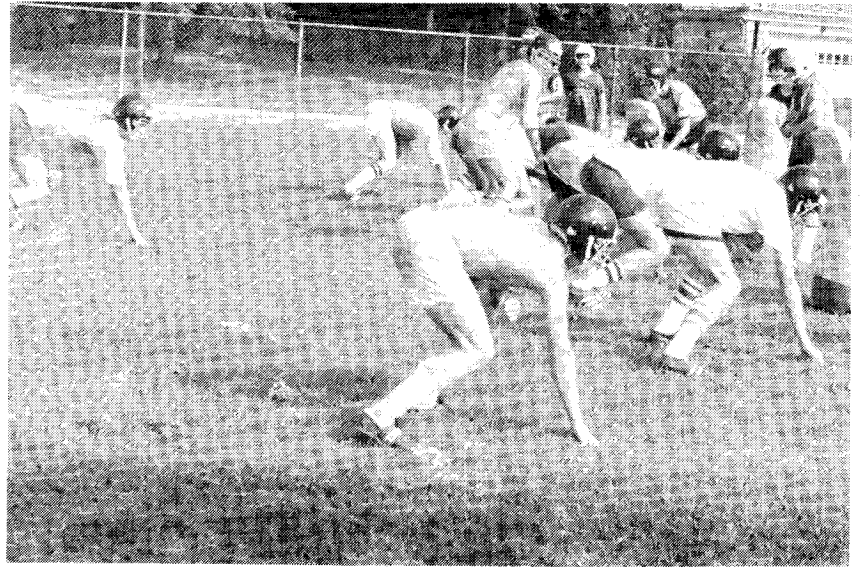
# Sportorial

The Bear Cubs are coached by the always-moving Mr. Sebastian and by that fine young coach, none other than Mr. McKenzie.

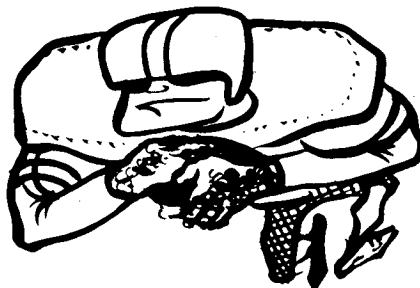

We need some new tennis nets for tennis.

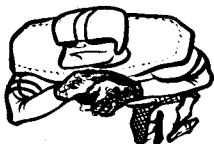
I would like to see the people who make second or third string playing more.
